Chief of Police Elmer R. Hafer Aberdeen Police Department, Ohio

End of Watch: Friday, December 10, 1954

Chief Elmer Hafer was struck by a truck after telling the truck driver to move. The driver was parked on the side of US 52 and sleeping when Chief Hafer woke him. Chief Hafer was taken to the hospital and died six day later

Chief Hafer's father, Constable Lee Hafer, was killed in the line of duty two years earlier.

End of Watch: Saturday, July 5, 1986

Chief Murray Griffin was shot and killed with his own weapon after he responded to a domestic disturbance call. Other responding officers found him shot to death and the female complainant stabbed to death. A suspect was arrested approximately found years later but all charges were dropped and no new charges were ever filed. Chief Griffin had been with the agency for 25 years. He was a veteran of World War II and is buried in the Fair View Cemetery, Belle Center, Ohio.
